This year's top Hereford & Worcester Fire and Rescue Service Young Firefighter is Hannah Sinclair-Elechi. The award is nominated annually by the leader of the Young Firefighters Association.

Hannah received her award from Worcestershire's High Sheriff Edward Holloway at the annual HWFRS Worcestershire awards ceremony at Worcester Guild Hall.

In announcing the award, Group Commander Rob Allen commented that those making the nomination said this was the easiest decision they had ever had to make and that Hannah's enthusiasm has shone through in everything that she does.

"The YFA is special to me because, before, I struggled with my confidence and it has really helped me with that," said Hannah.

"I didn't know too many people before and it's been helpful to have this family outside of where I usually am in Worcester. Being a member of the YFA gives us plenty of scope to do things, for example to go to open





days around the fire stations, while I have even had the chance to drive cars and fire trucks which has been really exciting as well.

"I have worked really hard so it's nice to have been recognised. I feel quite proud of myself and I know that my family are proud of me, too."

Sue and Ade's wonderful service to YFA recognised



Ade and Sue Taylor's immense contribution to Droitwich YFA over two decades has been honoured at the Hereford & Worcester Fire and Rescue Service Worcestershire Medal & Award Ceremony.

Ade and Sue received the Chairman's Certificate of Commendation from Hereford & Worcester Fire Authority chairman Roger Phillips at the awards ceremony at Worcester Guildhall.

In announcing the award, Group Commander Rob Allen said that Sue and Ade had volunteered their time from the inception of the Droitwich Young Firefighters branch in 1999 and their work had been pivotal in the development of hundreds of young people.

"For me the magic of the YFA is the young people," said Sue, who was celebrating her birthday on the night of the awards and was presented with a bouquet of flowers in addition to her award.

"It's watching the young people develop, succeed and become more disciplined and confident."

"Over the 20 years, we have 13 or 14 of our Young Firefighters who have gone on and are now serving in Hereford & Worcester Fire and Rescue Service, either wholetime or retained," said Ade.

"Some have gone on to be with other Services and a lot have gone on to other uniformed services, as paramedics or in the military.

"It's nice to be recognised but that's not what we're doing it for. We do it for the young people and we're accepting this award on behalf of those young people and of the other instructors who assist us – we couldn't do it without them.

"The association is going from strength to strength. It's not just young people from Droitwich, we have some who come from Bromyard, Worcester, Bromsgrove, Kidderminster – they come from quite a way to take part."
